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
Elízabeth Paonessa


ELIZABETH UTAH (PALMIERI) PAONESSA, of Bloomfield, wife of the late Louis Paonessa, died

Thursday, (July 29, 2004) at Greenbriar Health Center in Nashua, NH. She was born in New Britain, daughter of the late Genaro and Marie (Ronccanella) Palmieri and had lived in Simsbury prior to moving to Bloomfield several years ago. Mrs. Paonessa worked at the Travelers Insurance Company, for the U.S. government during World War II and as a buyer for Raphael's and Sage Allen Department Stores. After the death of her husband in 1978, she moved to Simsbury and became active in community, theatrical, and political organizations. She served as secretary and board member for the Seniors of Simsbury, co-founded a seniors' bridge group, held several offices during her membership in the Farmington Valley Chapter of AARP and worked for the historical society of Simsbury. She was a member and Parliamentary Chair for the Woman's Club of Simsbury, a member of the Wadsworth Athenaeum, member of the Affordable Housing Coalition and hosted Christmas house tours as a fund raiser for ABC house. Elizabeth was secretary of the Simsbury chapter of A Connecticut Party, campaigned for several political candidates, regardless of political affiliation, and served as Justice of the Peace for Simsbury. Mrs. Paonessa had received the first Hometown Hero award given by the town of Simsbury and was the only person to receive the award a second time just a few years later. She was a member of the biography society of Avon where she portrayed Catherine the Great and Mary Todd Lincoln. She played a woman stricken with Alzheimer's disease in "About Mama," an instructional tape for Child and Family Services, Inc. She started performing with the Theatre Guild of Simsbury in 1985, when she played the Queen of Transylvania in "My Fair Lady" She acted in "Life with Elizabeth," "Oceana" and other original works for local theatre groups. Elizabeth is survived by her two daughters and a son-in-law, Carole and Gordon Clarke of Amherst, NH and Darcie Peterson of Bloomfield; three grandchildren, Adam Clarke, Elissa Kahn and Louisa Sokolowski; eight great grandchildren and one great, great granddaughter. She was predeceased by her six brothers and sisters. For many of us, Elizabeth is like a unicorn - a free spirit who is forever young.



(CA.), College of Marin (CA), Manchester H.S. and Summit Studios where she currently teaches dance, acting, and voice. She toured nationally with the Chamber Theatre Co. of Boston production of "Encore!" Favorite roles include: Lucille Frank in "Parade," Anna in "Burn This," Ado Annie in "Oklahoma," Lucy (Understudy) in "Jekyll & Hyde," Sheila in "A Chorus Line," and Alma in "Summer and Smoke." Other credits include: "West Side Story," "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum," "Of Thee I Sing," "Pirates of Penzance," and "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown!" Karen Sidel (The Countess Dupont) - We liked Karen's performance of Lady Boxington in last year's "My Fair Lady" so much that we invited her back this year and promoted her to Countess! She's also been Queen Eleanor of Aquitaine in two performances of "The Lion in Winter." And Lady Cynthia Muldoon in "The Real Inspector Hound," so maybe there's some royalty in her acting blood. Karen has worked with several area groups over the past 15 years, including The Windsor Jesters, Manchester Theatre Festival, New Britain Rep, Canton Benefit Productions, and the Park Road Playhouse in West Hartford. Karen also directed the TGS Studio Theatre production of "Night of January 16th" in September. She thinks TGS is very brave to give a non-singer such a big song, and she thinks she's brave for doing it!

WHO'S WHO IN THE CAST

Rick Anderson (Bennett): Riding in on the tails of the outrageous mustache he wore as Karpathy in last year's TGS production of "My Fair Lady," Rick as Bennett gets a shot at one of his favorite theatre roles - the character villain. He has appeared in more than two dozen community theatre shows over 20 years, many with the Suffield Players, where he currently serves on their board. Among his credits have been Jorgy in "Other People's Money," Jerry in "Zoo Story" (which won two ACTConn awards), Teddy in "Arsenic and Old Lace," Captain von Trapp in "The Sound of Music," Harold Hill in "The Music Man," Chris in "All My Sons," Richard III in the "Last Trial of Richard III," Colonel Puckerup in "Victoria Falls," Blore in "Ten Little Indians," Charles in "Love Letters," Malcolm and Duncan in "MacBeth," and Dracula in more shows than he'd like to admit. 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"MISS LIBERTY" SYNOPSIS

A love story that spans two continents, and America's search for the girl who represents our symbol of freedom...MISS LIBERTY.

Journey back to 1885 when the pedestal for the Statue of Liberty was about to be dedicated, thanks to the monies given by the readers of the two rival newspapers, the New York World and the Herald. Meet Horace Miller, a newspaper photographer with more heart than sense. Always looking for the meaning behind the picture, he gets fired when he photographs the statue lying in its crates rather than the flashy ceremony. Deciding he doesn't belong in a big town, he vows to return home to Indiana until his friend Maisie (who, unbeknownst to him, happens to be in love with him) convinces him to go to Paris to find the girl who posed for the statue. In hopes of regaining his job, he goes, and there he meets Monique, whom he mistakes for the Liberty model. Thrilled to have found her, he tells Maisie, who convinces his old boss that this story will beat the pants off his biggest competitor, Joseph Pulitzer. Unable to resist the thought of of besting his arch rival, Bennett wires a huge some of money to Horace to bring Monique back with him for "Miss Liberty's American Tour." Helplessly caught up in the romance of Paris, Horace falls madly in love with Monique and convinces her to return with him. At the last minute, he discovers that he has the wrong girl, and in the biggest lie he's ever told, they set sail for America. Maisie finds herself trapped in a love triangle when they return, Monique uncovers Horace's lie, and complications abound when they all find out that Pulitzer personally knows the sculptor who created the Statue of Liberty. Eventually, the deception is revealed, but a happy ending is inevitable when the public rallies around MISS LIBERTY.

Based on a true story, the well written script and delightful score ensure a wonderful production, complete with an incredibly moving version of Emma Lazarus's poem "Give Me Your Tired, Your Poor" set to music.



Message from our Director, Lud Baldwin

"Miss Liberty!" is a marvelous Broadway show, encompassing the colors of vaudeville, the discipline of a good book, and the glorious music of Irving Berlin. The Theatre Guild this year is taking a considerable risk, reviving a show that hasn't been done in the state since 1983, when it was produced at Goodspeed Opera House. This musical was born in the shadow of South Pacific, and in spite of that considerable competition managed to run on Broadway for almost a year.

It harkens back to an era when things were a bit simpler, and the country had fewer demands on the national conscience; a time when love songs carried a bit more weight. This is happy, sweet, pure and innocent entertainment, full of polish and dash, and the original choreography of Jerome Robbins coupled with Robert Sherwood's book entranced the audiences that were already enraptured by Berlin's music. It has been a wonderful revelation, as the rehearsals progressed, to realize what a classic we have uncovered. Who knew when we began this journey that it would have such a fabulous ending- a show that brings us together as a cast, which reminds us of the glory of being Americans.

With little precedent to guide us, we were able to find the laughs, share the joys, and revel in the music we are presenting here. We hope you will enjoy it as much as we have
